## **Recipe**

This issue's recipe is kindly supplied by Louisa Jarrett.

## **Currant Tea Bread**

3/4 pint cold tea 7oz soft light brown sugar 12oz currants 10oz SR flour If you have a favourite recipe that you would like to share, we'd love to hear from you! Please send it to the warbler email address on the front page, or drop it in to Cobweb Cottage.

- 1. Put the tea, sugar and currants into a bowl and leave to soak overnight.
- 2. Preheat the oven to 180C (Gas 4)
- 3. Grease a 2lb loaf tin well
- 4. Mix the fruit, sugar and liquid into the flour and add the beaten egg. Mix together thoroughly until smooth.
- 5. Turn into the baking tin and bake for 1 3/4 hours.
- 6. Turn out and cool on a wire rack. Delicious enjoyed either on its own or smothered with butter and cup of tea (or coffee)!

## Establishing a 'Wildflower Green' in Upper Wardington

This spring a group of Cowslip plants flowered on a small area of grass opposite the old Red Lion in Upper Wardington. The origin of these plants is not known, but they are possibly self-established from wild seed. This area of green had been planted with Bluebells a few years ago (when bulbs were planted in a number of locations), but they have not persisted here, partly due to the mowing regime. The Cowslips have grown well this year and the mowing contractors were very helpful in agreeing to leave the patch of grass uncut during the flowering period, and a little longer, to enable to seeds to set and potentially spread further across the grass.



To enable the Cowslips to flourish in future years the Parish Council has agreed that this area of grass will not be mown until July each year. This is the same regime as a traditional a hay meadow. In addition to helping the Cowslips flourish, a July cut will enable other flowering plants to establish. To facilitate this, some locally collected seed (including Yellow Rattle and Meadow Saxifrage, both of which grow in local meadows) will be scattered across the area and raked-in. Local children could be involved in doing this, and counting the Cowslips and other flowers each year, any volunteers please?

The Cowslips looked very attractive this spring, enhancing the look of the village scene, as well as helping conserve our native flowers. I hope the 'Wildflower Green' will be a welcome addition to the village and a small but significant step forward in helping make our local environment an even better place for wildlife.

## THE CHURCH DURING LOCKDOWN

As everyone is aware regrettably one of the many restrictions imposed by the government in late March was to require all 'places of worship' to be closed totally for the foreseeable future. Sadly this even precluded the clergy from holding virtual services or streaming services from churches.

However for the past three months every Sunday at 10.00am and every Tuesday at 12.00noon our Vicar, Hilary Campbell, has been leading prayers from the vicarage via Zoom. The Sunday prayers have now ceased but after a short break the Tuesday prayers will continue from 11<sup>th</sup> August. Since the end of June it has been possible for the Church to be open for private prayer and individual visiting on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays but please do take note of the notices regarding Covid-19 precautions.

Covid-19 and the resultant lockdown period has been very difficult, although very necessary, for everyone in a mass of different ways. Let us pray that by Christmas we are able to celebrate that most important Christian festival in the manner to which we are all accustomed.

## **CHURCHYARD**

- 4. Do not use this equipment if you or any member of your household has coronavirus symptoms, or are self-isolating.
- 5. Ensure you have hand sanitiser with you before entering this play area.
- 6. Encourage everyone in your family to use hand sanitiser regularly and as a minimum before and after using the play area.
- 7. Encourage children to avoid touching their faces.
- 8. No food or drink is to be consumed within the playground
- 9. Enter through the IN gate and exit through the OUT gate.
- 10. You MUST maintain social distancing from others unless they are from the same household it is the playground users responsibility to be up to date and adhere the most current government advice.

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## Murder on the hill

It is a bleak, dark, January evening. There are patches of snow on the road from an earlier flurry. An older man is walking down a hill. Behind him, to his right, a younger man is leading a horse and cart. The younger man suddenly raises his right hand. There is a crack, a flash of fire and smoke and the older man collapses to the ground. The young man approaches the older one and fires another shot which grazes the supine man's forehead. The second shot is gratuitous; the man on the road is already dead.

The young man takes the gun, wraps it in a coat and pushes it down into a nearby drainage ditch. He then starts to make his way across the fields towards Banbury illuminated by the glow of the gas street lamps three miles away.

The year was 1852, the older man was John, the younger man was his nephew William and the hill, officially named after the nearby village of Williamscot, would afterwards be known to locals as Kalabergo's hill. John Kalabergo had moved to Banbury after leaving his home near Milan in Northern Italy during the Napoleonic Wars which had swept through Europe at the end of the 18<sup>th</sup> and the beginning of the 19<sup>th</sup> Century. Moving to England, he ended up in Banbury, built up his business and became a British citizen. By the late 1840s he had a shop in the High Street and was able to loan the Catholic Church £500 (about £70000 in today's money) to help build St John the Evangelist Roman Catholic Church on South Bar Street.

The shop was important, but a major part of his trade came from going out on a horse and cart, travelling round the surrounding villages, selling his barometers and picking up and returning clocks and watches that had been repaired.

Recently however, he was starting to feel the cold and the trips out in all weathers were becoming too much. Back in Italy his brother had died several years before and letters from his Sister in Law were full of complaints about his nephew William who was mixing with a bad crowd, getting into all sorts of trouble.

A solution was suggested. William would come to England. He could take over the hard work and learn his Uncle's trade. It seemed ideal. William would be taken away from the people who were leading him astray and John would have someone, a member of his own family, to take over the business. John agreed but with the proviso that William would have to live by his rules. William agreed.

This solution however did not work. John was very strict and William was not interested in learning John's business. Like most young men, he wanted to be out meeting girls and enjoying himself. William had only pocket money, no freedom and missed his home. He

knew that his uncle's will divided his money and possessions (which included property in Italy and well as Banbury) between himself and his three sisters. With his uncle out of the way he would inherit a substantial sum. His problems would be solved.

He stole some watches and money from his uncle's shop and bought a double-barrelled pistol, gunpowder, percussion caps and a mould for making bullets from a local shop. He had heard stories of the Culworth Gang who operated in that area ten years before. The plan was beginning to form.

After murdering his uncle, William had returned to Banbury in a very distressed state claiming that they had been attacked by robbers. He had escaped, he explained but his uncle had been shot after fighting back. Soon, however, his story began to unravel. It was found that John had not been robbed and none of the goods on the cart had ben touched. William was searched and gunpowder and a percussion cap were found. He admitted buying a gun but said he done so for his uncle. A search of the shop stables had uncovered a bullet mould and the subsequent discovery of a matching bullet with John's body and the later recovery of the gun (identified by the shop owner as the one sold to William) wrapped in the John's coat convinced the local authorities that he had killed his uncle.

William continued to protest his innocence. At his trial in Oxford, despite all of the evidence against him being circumstantial and the Prosecution attributing no motive to his actions, the Jury took only 15 minutes to find him guilty. The Judge sentenced him to death by hanging. During his last few days, he asked for a priest and finally confessed to the murder. On the morning of the execution he was taken from his cell to the gallows. The noose was put round his neck, the platform beneath him swung down and, kicking and arching, he took several minutes to suffocate in front of an estimated crowd of about 10000, many of whom had walked from Banbury for the occasion. He was 22 years of age.

John Kalabergo's gravestone can still be seen, just on the left-hand side at St Johns Church.

Further information can be found in the book John Kalabergo of Banbury by E.R. Lester which contains a narrative account of these events as well as a lot of local information about Banbury in the mid-19<sup>th</sup> Century.



## 5. Parish business

**5.1** There is a consultation for a puffin crossing.

**5.2** Insurance – invoice received for renewal, enquiries to be made about fixing price.

**5.3** Mr N Bankes reported on a proposal from Cropredy to extend Monks Walk between Williamscot and Cropredy – this clearing work is to be undertaken by the residents (not the WPC) and hopefully will be done by the end of summer.

5.4 Wardington Past and Present booklet - this is a booklet that is traditionally available from the porch in the Church. Copies of the last edition, printed in 1997, have run out. It is being updated and reprinted by the Parochial Church Council. Mr M Patterson proposed a copy should be given to all new households as part of the Welcome Pack, the cost to be met by the Parish Council. This was agreed. As part of this commitment it was agreed to pay £150 up front for 50 copies once they were printed.

**5.5** It was agreed that the Council should take out a Zoom subscription. This to be reviewed after one year. Mr M Patterson offered to implement this and reclaim the cost. Post Meeting note: currently the cost is £119.90 a year or £11.99 if billed monthly.

**5.6** Williamscot tubs – certificate of compliance in the process

**5.7** Village hall grants – the Chairman raised the matter with Cllr G Reynolds. Post Meeting note: further clarification was provided by Cllr Reynolds and Cllr Chapman. Subsequently the Memorial Hall committee has submitted an application for the fixed £10,000 grant for loss of income and support to communities under the Covid 19 provisions

- 2.1 The 2019/2020 accounts have now been audited Five Day Notice T1 x sycamore with rotting trunk and Clerk signed AGAR paperwork during the meeting. Chairman to sign AGAR paperwork shortly after meeting - councillors agreed this was acceptable and accepted the accounts and the audit.
- 2.2 Mr G Martin has been investigating banking alternatives. The Unity Trust Bank seems to be a suitable option that is already used by a lot of Charities and Parish Councils. It would allow the Clerk to set up payments online through a simple portal and then councillors could go online to authorise payments. There is a cost of £6 per month. (Post Meeting Note: This figure is per account). It was agreed that whilst this seemed to be the way forward, there was no rush until social distancing was eased.
- 2.3 HS2 information regarding upcoming road closures (July/August) has been put on the website. A summarised version will be put on the noticeboards.
- **2.3** Covid nothing new to report.
- 2.4 Williamscot super-fast internet there is now fibre to most properties in Williamscot. There is some difficulty with connecting all houses so each property dealt with on an individual basis. Mr G Martin is due to be connected and once that is sorted then information will appear in the Warbler. In the meantime he will involve other residents via the Williamscot WhatsApp group.
