

Recipe

This issue's recipe is supplied out of my own recipe book

Quick and Easy Flatbread

150g bread flour (I use white)

1tsp yeast (dry active or instant)

1/2tsp salt

230ml warm water (about 40degC)

2tsps olive oils


If you have a favourite recipe that you would like to share, we'd love to hear from you! Please send it to the warbler email address on the front page, or drop it in to Cobweb Cottage.

- 1. Place the sifted flour yeast and salt into a mixing bowl.
- 2. Add the water and oil, mix by hand and knead for 1 minute.
- 3. Place the dough (it will be sticky) on a floured surface and cover with a towel. Let it rest for 10 mins.
- 4. After 10 mins, preheat a skillet or a heavy based frying pan over a medium-high heat.
- 5. Divide the dough into four and shape each piece into a ball.
- 6. Roll each ball into a 6" circle.
- 7. Cook in the ungreased hot pan for about 1 min per side.

This is quick, simple and versatile—it can be used to make your own gyros, pizza, sliced and dipped into hummus or used as an emergency bread to have with soup on a cold winter's day. Good luck!

NEWS FROM ST MARY MAGDALENE CHURCH

OUR CHURCH IN THIS STRANGE YEAR

Since March life for the Church in the broadest sense and in our own Church building itself has been different to anything almost anyone has experienced before. During WW2 the Church was of course a central focus point for many but this year we have had to experience for the first time in living memory when visiting a church was forbidden.

Fortunately in July we were able to open the Church once again for individual visiting and private prayer and in August two services were held. Then fortunately Harvest Festival at the beginning of last month brought our Church back to life for all those who attended the service. Sadly singing is currently not permitted and so we missed all the old favourites such as "We plough the fields and scatter" but the beautifully decorated Church made up for it.

Our Act of Remembrance will take place with a slightly longer gathering around the War Memorial starting at 10.55am but with no service following in the Church.

Christmas services are currently in the planning but, with social distancing and probably no collective carol singing, we are looking at further ways to celebrate this coming festive season.

The Church will continue to be open for individual visiting and private prayer on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays throughout the winter.



DONATIONS

The PCC would like to take this opportunity of thanking those in the village who have made voluntary donations to the Church during the year. Clearly the months without Church services have led to a reduction in income through there being no collections and so the extra donations, both large and small, have been much appreciated.

PEAL BOARD

A Peal Board to record the ringing of a full peal to mark Evelyn Phillips' 101st birthday last year has been installed in the ringing room.

This is the traditional method of recording the ringing of a full peal in a church tower and will be a familiar site in many churches around the country. Only three other full peals have been rung at Wardington in the past sixty years although none of these are recorded with a board. Let's hope in years to come there will be more.

FOR YOUR OWN SAFETY AND THE SAFETY OF OTHERS Guidance for Families using this Play Area

To ensure you are ready to use this Play Area safely please read these simple instructions and plan ahead for safe fun this summer.

- This equipment is checked for damage, wear and tear, and is in safe working order as of June 2020 (any damage or concerns should be reported to the Parish Clerk at wardingtonparishcouncil@hotmail.co.uk) BUT IS NOT SANITISED OR DISINFECTED WARDINGTON PARISH COUNCIL DOES NOT TAKE ANY RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE CLEANING OR HYGIENE OF THE PLAYGROUND EQUIPMENT.
- 3. This is shared equipment, used at your own risk.
- 4. Do not use this equipment if you or any member of your household has coronavirus symptoms, or are self-isolating.
- 5. Ensure you have hand sanitiser with you before entering this play area.
- 6. Encourage everyone in your family to use hand sanitiser regularly and as a minimum before and after using the play area.
- 7. Encourage children to avoid touching their faces.
- 8. No food or drink is to be consumed within the playground
- 9. Enter through the IN gate and exit through the OUT gate.
- 10. You MUST maintain social distancing from others unless they are from the same household it is the playground users responsibility to be up to date and adhere the most current government advice.
- 11. There is a limit to 2 children per piece of equipment and a total of 10 children in the playground at a time. Please ensure your family waits at a safe distance if equipment is in use or return later to use the equipment.
- 12. We ask that you clean the playground equipment before and after use.
- 13. If your family chose to wear disposable PPE and you chose to clean the equipment yourself prior to children playing, please take it home with you DO NOT LITTER.
- 14. If the playground is being used as part of the village hall hire, then hirers need to abide by the above and operate a waiting area if necessary.
- 15. Wash your hands when you get home.







Let us what you are doing to help the village and community or perhaps get involved in one of the many projects and groups in the parish (see our sign cleaning push above, or the advert for help with the playground also in this issue).

You may have noticed some wheat sheaves appearing around the village as part of the decoration for harvest festival - these were very kindly provided by Dr Matthew Kerton who works up at Top Dawkins for DSV. Dr Kerton, at the request of Roderick Stell, has written a few words about what goes on there.

What goes on at Top Dawkins Barn?

Some of you will have noticed the wheat and grass plots, neat little rectangles, cropping up around Wardington over the years. You may have seen the small harvesters busily driving up and down the fields and returning, after a long day, to Top Dawkins Barn. So what is going on behind the double gates at DSV United Kingdom on the Chacombe/Wardington junction?

DSV UK used to work from the Adams' farm over at Appletree and we moved to our current premises in 2008. We are a small team of plant breeders, researching and developing new varieties of forage grasses and winter wheat. We work closely with our local farmers George Page, Roy Hall and Dean Cox.

New varieties of crops are needed by farmers because existing varieties can become susceptible to pests and diseases. New varieties also provide better yields and can address changes in end-market requirements. Some varieties will grow well on certain soil types or in certain regions of the UK while others are suited elsewhere.

To develop new varieties, the team at DSV UK begin by crossing two plants together to combine their genetics. Then over many years of testing and artificial selection, we narrow down our options from thousands to just a handful. Selections include finding the plants which have resistance to diseases which might reduce reliance on chemical inputs. Selections for yield (mass of grass growth or grains of wheat) are measured using the green harvesters that you may have seen. These cut each plot in turn and weigh the product. They can also measure things such as how much moisture is in the sample, and how much sugar and protein is present. When we aren't out in the field, we are inside analysing the previous years' samples with laboratory equipment. All of this data and the many notes taken by the team are collated and used in selecting which plants go through to the following year.

Once we are happy that we have some potential new varieties, they are entered into the official trials. Further data is captured and the government decides which will become registered varieties in the UK. Our sales and marketing team then have the task of encouraging farmers to try the new varieties to see if they can benefit from the new, improved genetics.



WHAT 3 WORDS

Over 80% of services in the UK now use what3words, so I thought this would be a good opportunity to encourage your community to download the what3words app on their phones in case they need to call 999.

You can find a full list of those services that accept what3words here: https://what3words.com/news/emergency-response. Your community could also use what3words to report incidents with organisations like National Grid, Network Rail and the Environmental Agency: https://what3words.com/report-incident-locations-efficiently.



The app divides the planet's surface into grids measuring 3x3m and uses an algorithm to assign a unique three-word marker to each of the 57 trillion squares, giving a much simpler, yet accurate, locator mark than a lengthy grid reference

5. Parish business

5.1 Layby on A361 as you enter Wardington – complaints of littering and human fouling. Thanks offered to Cllr G Reynolds who helped get it all cleared up within days. The CDC employee who empties the bins in the village will also keep an eye on this. Discussion of a permanent sign to be put up, bins to be provided and public health officer involvement due to the nature of the problem.

5.2 HS2 - Community service offer has been received from Fusion/HS2 and the village has asked for the bus shelters to be renovated. This has been accepted providing we provide the kit and this should happen mid to late September. All delighted to see safety railing at Old Bonhams corner erected. It looks like works should be completed in mid-September. In October and November planting will take place?

5.3 Meeting in person at Memorial Hall – the current guidance from OALC is to stay online. WPC proposes putting the meeting agendas online and members of the public can contact Clerk if they wish to attend: their agenda item will be discussed first.

5.4 Change of use application for land near Gt Bourton – concerns raised about flooding, sewage, change of land use and adverse visual effect. WPC concerned it is not our parish though the land is on our border and could affects rights of way etc. Gt Bourton Council have voiced opinions on matters of planning in Williamscot before. (Post meeting note: following further consultation, no action to be taken)

5.5 Brent Harris has quoted £638.17 to fix playground based on RoSPA report. Accepted. **5.6** Storm bus shelter damage opposite the Greensward – Roderick Stell has very kindly offered to fix this. He also volunteered to look after the shelter in the future, keeping it clean and tidy as part of the Parish Volunteer scheme.

6. AOB

6.1 Manhole covers on the main road – these are still causing a problem and Clerk to speak to Thame Water. Cllr Reynolds to monitor the situation from the OCC Highways side of things.

- **6.3** Cllr Reynolds complimented Mr R Jarrett on his ability to work so well with HS2Fusion and to get work done as a result.
- 6.4 Mrs J Burnett had been in discussion with the Clerk about dog poo bags and bins. Following research the Clerk reported that CDC do not hand them out for free to WPC but there are various 'hubs' where they can be got from. Cllr Reynolds to ask Trafford about this. Williamscot have requested council has no pressing issues to raise etc this a dog poo bin – clerk to obtain quote for this.
- **6.5** Williamscot have decided not to put planters in front of their village signs.

5. Parish business
