# **Recipe**

This issue's recipe is one that I've recently discovered in Sainsbuyr's Bake magazine. It is a little bit more effort but totally worth it!


### Queen of Heart Jam Tarts

Plain flour, for dusting 1/2 x 500g black shortcrust pastry 25g soft butter 25g caster sugar 1 medium egg, beaten 40g ground almonds 100g seedless raspberry jam If you have a favourite recipe that you would like to share, we'd love to hear from you! Please send it to the warbler email address on the front page, or drop it in to Cobweb Cottage.

- Lightly dust a clean work surface with flour. Roll out the pastry until about 3mm thick. Using a
   7.5cm fluted round cutter, stamp out 12 circles of pastry and use to line a 12-hole non-stick patter
   tin. Chill in the fridge for 30 minutes.
- 2. Preheat the oven to 180C (fan 160C). Meanwhile, gather the pastry trimmings together in a ball and re-roll. Then, stamp out 12 hearts with a 4cm heart cutter. Put onto a baking tray lined with baking paper. Bake in the oven for 5-8 minutes until golden.
- 3. To make the filling, beat together the butter and sugar in a bowl until pale and creamy. Then stir in 25g beaten egg (you can save the rest to brush on scones or a pie), ground almonds and almond extract until well combined.
- 4. Divide the almond mixture equality between the pastry cases, smooth level with the back of a teaspoon, then bake in the oven for 15 minutes until lightly golden. Remove from the oven and, using the back of a teaspoon, press down on the tops of the almond mixture to flatten slightly. Heat the jam in a small pan until melted and spoon a little into each one to cover the top completely. Return to the oven for 5 minutes.
- 5. Remove and top each with a pastry heart. Leave to cool for 10 minutes, then enjoy warm or cold!



# **NEWS FROM ST MARY MAGDALENE CHURCH**

### HRH THE PRINCE PHILIP, DUKE OF EDINBURCH - 1921-2021

The Bishop of Oxford wrote:

"We give thanks for Prince Philip's long and extraordinary life, his faithful service to Queen and country, his support especially for young people, his humour, honesty and integrity and strong Christian faith and especially his steadfast support to the Queen over the long years of their marriage"



Wardington Church marked the death of the Duke of Edinburgh by flying the Union Flag at half-mast throughout the period of national mourning.

Special prayers were said in the Churches across our Benefice.

On both the day of his death and on the day of the funeral the tenor bell was tolled – on the latter occasion there were ninety-nine strikes, one for every year of his life.



### **EASTER & CHURCH SERVICES**

At present communal singing inside churches is still not permitted and so we took the decision to hold our Easter Day family service in the churchyard hoping for fine weather.

It was a lovely sunny morning with clear blue skies and over sixty villagers, including plenty of children, came for the simple service led by Sue Upton. The special festival of Easter is not complete without some traditional hymns which included *Amazing Grace* and *Thine be the Glory, risen conquering Son*.

Thank you everyone for your support.

Looking ahead we are now back to a regular pattern of monthly services as shown on the calendar elsewhere. The Church also continues to be open for private prayer every Friday, Saturday and Sunday. ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING

This meeting (Church AGM), at which is the Churchwardens and lay members of the PCC are elected, normally takes place in April. In view of the ongoing Covid-19 restrictions it has been postponed until Sunday, 20<sup>th</sup> June. As last year it will be held after the morning service which appears to be a more convenient time than a midweek evening.

# FOR YOUR OWN SAFETY AND THE SAFETY OF OTHERS Guidance for Families using this Play Area

To ensure you are ready to use this Play Area safely please read these simple instructions and plan ahead for safe fun this summer.

- 1. Parents must read this guidance and ensure their families follow it carefully for the safety of their children and others.
- This equipment is checked for damage, wear and tear, and is in safe working order as of June 2020 (any damage or concerns should be reported to the Parish Clerk at wardingtonparishcouncil@hotmail.co.uk) BUT IS NOT SANITISED OR DISINFECTED WARDINGTON PARISH COUNCIL DOES NOT TAKE ANY RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE CLEANING OR HYGIENE OF THE PLAYGROUND EQUIPMENT.
- 3. This is shared equipment, used at your own risk.
- 4. Do not use this equipment if you or any member of your household has coronavirus symptoms, or are self-isolating.
- 5. Ensure you have hand sanitiser with you before entering this play area.
- 6. Encourage everyone in your family to use hand sanitiser regularly and as a minimum before and after using the play area.
- 7. Encourage children to avoid touching their faces.
- 8. No food or drink is to be consumed within the playground
- 9. Enter through the IN gate and exit through the OUT gate.
- 10. You MUST maintain social distancing from others unless they are from the same household it is the playground users responsibility to be up to date and adhere the most current government advice.
- 11. There is a limit to 2 children per piece of equipment and a total of 10 children in the playground at a time. Please ensure your family waits at a safe distance if equipment is in use or return later to use the equipment.
- 12. We ask that you clean the playground equipment before and after use.
- 13. If your family chose to wear disposable PPE and you chose to clean the equipment yourself prior to children playing, please take it home with you DO NOT LITTER.
- 14. If the playground is being used as part of the village hall hire, then hirers need to abide by the above and operate a waiting area if necessary.
- 15. Wash your hands when you get home.

Their enthusiasm for the village was evident immediately and very soon they were supporting many activities including the refurbishment of the Memorial Hall, the Church and, naturally, the Garden Club.

They generously hosted many summer fêtes and regularly opened the Manor gardens in aid of local charities such as Katherine House.

Sadly the family are moving on from the Manor in mid-May. We in Wardington are going to miss, not just their constant *joie de vivre*, but also their unstinting support for everyone and everything in the village. We owe them a huge debt of gratitude and wish the whole family well in the future.

# Wardington Nature Notes Learn to love your Ivy!

It has been wonderful to see so much wildlife around our village over the winter period, especially during the snow in January when noisy flocks of Fieldfares feasted on windfall apples and berries in our gardens and the allotments. They are normally out in the fields and hedgerows where they find plenty of worms and berries, but in hard weather they really appreciate the extra food we can offer. It is the same with the berries of the Ivy growing up or trees and along walls. They provide extra food for our Blackbirds and Blackcaps, and snug roosting places as the temperature drop well below zero. Imagine what it must be like for a wren or Robin in those conditions!

I have a pair of Blackbirds that build a nest every year hidden away in the Ivy growing on our wall in the back garden – the Ivy provides great cover in the early spring before most shrubs have come into leaf. You might also spot a beautiful blue butterfly flitting around the Ivy, this will most likely be a Holly Blue - they will often lay their eggs on Ivy as well as Holly. In autumn, the Ivy blossoms profusely and provides a rich source of nectar for our bees and butterflies, especially the Red Admiral.

It is very tempting to try to stop Ivy growing and from time-to-time control will be required, but if you can leave it as much as possible the birds, bees and butterflies will be incredibly grateful this spring and summer. To quote the Royal Horticultural Society - 'On most trees that are in sound health and are not being grown for their attractive bark, ivy can be allowed to grow on the trunk without concern for the tree's health or vigour'. Their website contains some particularly useful guidance, do have a read before you decide to control ivy.

This spring I hope to see more Cowslips flourishing on the green in Upper Wardington where we are leaving a small area uncut until the summer to allow some of our native flowers to bloom. Do stop and have a look, you may be surprised how many different flowers you can spot. This is just one of many simple and rewarding things we can do to help give nature some space to flourish. There is lots of great

information available these days, especially online, for example: https://www.bbowt.org.uk/actions, but it you need any pointers do let me know.

# **The Battle of Edgcote**

On 24<sup>th</sup> July 1469, just the other side of Fox Hill, thousands of heavily armed men met and killed each other over the course of a few brief hours. Yet, although it occurred in the middle of the conflict known today as the Wars of the Roses, this was not a battle between supporters of the Red and White Roses but White and White.

Edward IV had taken the throne from Henry VI in 1461. Both were descended from sons of Edward III but, at a time when a King was expected to take a firm hand in running the country, Henry VI had shown himself unequal to the task. In taking the throne at the age of 18 the tall, charismatic Edward, was energetically supported by the Earl of Warwick who earned himself the epithet 'Kingmaker' and to whom Edward afterwards awarded many lands and titles. Warwick's influence was such that many saw him as the real power behind the throne.

However, the qualities that made Warwick indispensable in war and afterwards as a diplomat conflicted with what Edward needed in the peace that followed and he found himself increasingly sidelined as Edward's wife's family, the Woodvilles, (whom Warwick regarded as mere upstarts) became increasingly influential.

Early in 1469, Edward refused permission for his brother, the Duke of Clarence, to marry Warwick's daughter Isabel. For Warwick this was just the last in a series of perceived insults. He withdrew to Calais, England's last toehold in France, taking his family and Clarence with him. It was there that he plotted a revolt in his lands in the North of England and oversaw the marriage of Isabel to Clarence joining his bloodline with that of the Yorkist Royal family.

At first the rising did not concern Edward too much and he moved north to crush it. However, when he found out that not only were the rebel forces much stronger than those he had to hand but that also Warwick and his new son-in-law, Clarence, had landed in the South of England, he realised the peril he was in. With Warwick moving north proclaiming his supposed loyalty to Edward and the rebels moving south he was in danger of being caught in between them. He immediately sent for help from the Earls of Pembroke and Devon with instructions that they were to gather their forces and march towards him in the Midlands to prevent the rebels and Warwick joining forces at Northampton.

The accounts of what happened next are sketchy. There was a skirmish at Northampton after which the Royalist forces took up a position on the hill where Edgcote Lodge Farm now stands. This was an ideal location as it covered both main roads south from Northampton, the Daventry Road and Welsh Lane. However, although all of Pembroke's troop were there, the Duke of Devon's forces, including most of the archers, were some distance off possibly between Banbury and Deddington. Some sources say this followed an argument over billeting between the Earls, others that there had been a falling out over the affections of a Banbury bar maid. Whatever the truth, when the Rebels attacked the next morning, Pembroke's Welshmen found themselves on their own.

At first Pembroke's troops seemed to be winning but the turning point came when a fresh body of troops suddenly appeared on their right flank. Assuming these were the battle-hardened forces of Warwick, the Welshmen broke and ran. In the resultant rout it was said that somewhere in region of 2000 of Pembroke's men were killed although, considering the numbers involved, this may be an exaggeration. However, it seems that over 150 members of the Welsh nobility were killed.

Pembroke, who may have had the 12-year-old future King Henry VII with him, was captured and beheaded a week later. Devon was killed by a mob at Bridgewater some days after that. Many of the Woodville family and their supporters followed suit in the weeks that followed as Warwick took his revenge.

Edward was captured and taken to Middleham Castle as Warwick tried to pressure him to denounce the Woodvilles and reinstate himself as the King's key advisor. But Edward was no Henry VI and refused. Warwick, showing himself to be militarily astute but politically naïve, failed to get the support he needed from his fellow nobles and was unable, or unwilling. to take the final step of killing his old friend and anointed King.

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By September, Edward had been fully restored to his throne. He pardoned both Warwick and Clarence but they continued to plot against him. Warwick died at the Battle of Barnet in 1471 and Clarence, having been found guilty of treason, was executed in 1478 some said by being drowned in a vat of wine. Henry VII, who defeated Richard III at Bosworth Field in 1485 had learnt important lessons from the preceding turbulent years. He married Edward's daughter, Elizabeth (ending the war and uniting the Houses of York and Lancaster) and instituted a system of governance and taxation that ensured the troublesome nobility would come firmly under his control. His accession to the throne marked the end of the 331-year reign of the Plantagenets and the start of the age of the Tudors.



**5.1** Churchyard Extension hedge maintenance – this is owned by Wardington Parish Council. Hedge on three sides is becoming large and difficult to cut so should it be laid? ### 4. Outstanding matters/actions from previous meetings

**4.1** Ash Tree by the pond – Concerns have been raised indirectly by a parishioner about the condition of the Ash Tree as it appears to be at the end of its life and that large branches may fall. The Ash Tree is in an unregistered area of the village therefore it is not owned by the Parish Council (PC). The PC have been advised not to complete any work on trees that do not belong to them unless absolutely necessary. If it is considered a significant danger to the public it may be possible to get Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) to organise removal of the tree. Issues such as this should be reported to OCC using www.fixmystreet.com. It was agreed that no further action should be taken on this issue by the PC.

- 4.2 COMF funding Grant of £1,666 offered and accepted The plan is to use the funds primarily for a village get together, probably in September, dependent on the guidance at that time on public gatherings.
- **4.3** Handover of Clerk's responsibilities The Clerk advised that she has now handed over the majority of the financial documentation to Cllr Jarrett who will be acting as the RFO during her maternity leave and the handover has taken place with the Cover Clerk.

- 9. To consider plans for holding meetings in future taking account of COVID restrictions and the change to the rules regarding lawfulness of electronic meetings from 7th May 2021 – The PC are required to hold a meeting in May in order to elect the Chairman for the coming year. The rules allowing electronic meetings expire on 7th May but they could be reinstated depending on the outcome of a court hearing before the end of April. To ensure that the May meeting takes place it was agreed that a very brief electronic meeting to complete the statutory tasks should be held on, 5th or 6th May. Clerk to confirm meeting date once councillor availability has been confirmed. It is understood that public meetings will be able to take place again from 17th May but COVID safety measures will be required. Some councillors are concerned about the risks involved in having a public meeting before the majority of people have received their vaccinations so it was agreed to keep the original planned date of 25th May in the diary an reconsider whether this meeting should go ahead closer to the time.
- 10. To consider arrangements (if any) for advertising the Fairport ticket sales given the uncertainty due to COVID - Currently the Fairport organisers say they hope the event will be going ahead so they will be putting an advert for tickets in the Warbler.
- 11. Information exchange Cllr Reynolds stated that he is concerned about the number of lorry movements connected with planning applications and scoping reports involving HS2. He will be keeping an eye on them to ensure the number of lorries are kept to the limit allowed. Cllr Chapman advised that there was another burglary in Williamscott last Friday and he is concerned that the police do not seem to have done much about this despite quite a lot of information being made available to them. Cllr Chapman advised that Cropredy Parish Council has a quarterly meeting with the police to discuss crime in the area and this seems to be of benefit to the parish due to the open regular communication with the police. Clerk to put item regarding improving communication with the police on the next agenda.
