Recipe

This issue's recipe comes from Arun Dutta-Reynolds, a keen young cook. His Mum, Rina, has this to say:

When a glut of runner beans, green beans, courgettes or even marrows leaves us lacking in inspiration, we turn to Tarkari - a spicy vegetable side dish, originating from the Indian subcontinent.

This is a really simple Tarkari that our 10-year-old son, Arun likes to cook from scratch. It has the added advantages that you can use a mixture of any of the vegetables growing in abundance in your garden or allotment, and it is forgiving of more mature produce owing to the long, slow cooking time. (Courgettes and marrows will cook quicker, so can be added 15 minutes into the cooking time or the whole dish will simply cook more quickly if made using just these vegetables). The added bonus is that any leftovers are delicious blended up and used in a pasta sauce for a quick supper when time is of the essence.

Arun took up cooking over lockdown and started a little YouTube Channel "Arun Cooks!" last September, with the aim of inspiring families, children and young people to cook up simple meals and snacks for friends and family which are both nutritious and delicious! With his wit, chatter (and the occasional dance!) Arun's unscripted, spontaneous recordings are refreshing, uplifting...and one positive to have arisen from the calamity of COVID-19. Runner Bean Tarkari

Serves 6

- 1kg runner beans, sliced (or green beans, courgettes, marrows or a mixture as you have available)
- 2 tbsp mustard oil (or if not available, 2 tbsp extra virgin olive oil, a tsp of Colman's dry mustard powder and a heaped tsp of Wholegrain mustard all shaken together is a great substitute which we used)
- 1 tsp garam masala
- ½ tsp ground cumin
- ½ tsp ground turmeric
- ¼ tsp chilli flakes (omit or add more according to your taste)
- 1 tsp salt
- Juice of ½ lemon

If you have a favourite

Heat mustard oil in a large wok or pan which has a tight fitting lid.

- 2. When sizzling and fragrant, reduce the heat and add the garam masala, cumin, turmeric and chilli flakes (if using).
- 3. Gently add the beans to the pan and stir.
- 4. Add the salt and lemon juice and stir on a medium heat for a few minutes.
- 5. Cover with the lid and leave to cook on low heat for 30-35 minutes, depending on the maturity of your beans, stirring occasionally. (If using courgette / marrow pieces in the vegetable mixture, add 15 minutes into the cooking time)
- 6. If any liquid remains, increase the heat and fry off.

Serve with a sprinkle of paprika.

In a recent edition of the Warbler two parishioners suggested that the Parish Council and parishioners consider possible initiatives to help combat climate change, possibly with the introduction of a Climate Change Action Group. The Parish Council are supportive of such initiatives but they are not aware of anyone who is able or willing to create such a group and they don't have the resources within the parish council to create a group themselves. The Parish Council support the idea that small changes made at home can lead to big changes globally and would like to make parishioners aware of local recycling schemes that are available to them over and above their usual recycling waste collections.

ACT OF REMEMBRANCE

As last year our Act of Remembrance will take place on Remembrance Sunday with a gathering at the War Memorial commencing at 10.55am. The service will be a little longer than normal including the sounding of the Last Post and Reveille, the reading of the names on the memorial and the singing of hymns concluding with the National Anthem. There will be no further service in the Church afterwards. However there will be a collection for the Royal British Legion which will take the place of the house-to-house collection.

CHURCHYARD TREES

Almost four years ago we planted the first new tree in the churchyard for some twenty years. This was the Red Oak (*Quercus Rubra*) kindly donated by the late Hazel Steven. No doubt Hazel would be delighted to know that it is flourishing and has lived up its name with leaves turning a lovely red as autumn has approached.

Sadly we had to fell another of the lime trees this summer due to it being seriously diseased and potentially becoming a safety hazard. However we plan to plant a replacement as part of The Queen's Green Canopy which is a unique, UK-wide tree planting initiative created to mark Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee in 2022. HARVEST CELEBRATIONS

Our harvest celebrations this year were spread over almost three weeks. On Sunday, 3rd October we held our traditional Harvest Festival service in Church. The collection after the service was significant and £50 was donated from it to Farming Community Network, a Christian based farmers' support charity.

From the Vicar:

All Saints and All Soulstide

This is the month the clocks go back and the balance of day and night shifts again. We reach a thin time of the year, a season to face the shadows, a time for remembering. All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day have been observed for most of the Church's history. On All Saints' Day we remember all those ones we call holy, whose work people know something about: St Mary, St James, patron saints such as Andrew, David, Patrick, George; local saints such as Birinus, Frideswide, Fremund. All Soulstide is a time to remember 'the faithful departed': people who may not have made a mark on the world, though they made their mark on us, their loved ones. Souling was a custom which may have been the predecessor of 'trick or treating', when groups of people went house to house singing and asking for food (soul cakes – were like spiced biscuits) and drink in return for prayers for the dead and the living. Names are important, and at All Souls' services, names will be read of people we want to remember, with whom we still feel connected.

According to the church's way of telling time we are approaching the end of the year. A good time to reflect, to do our remembering, and to wonder how we might continue to put ourselves, and our communal lives back together again. The last Sunday of the church's year is called Christ the King, or the Reign of Christ. Time to think again about our image of what power means and how we use power for good in the world. I have a favourite image from the island of lona, where there is a large and striking sculpture by Ronald Rae. Carved in pink and grey Kemnay granite this powerful work portrays the Fallen Christ on the road to Calvary with the burden of the world on his back. An image of vulnerability of Christ the King who is in solidarity with those knocked down by life, who knows what it is to be as low and as powerless as it is possible to be. What image of power and leadership will inspire you as the seasons change once more?

Working in conjunction with the Chairman, responsibilities include preparing and circulating agendas and minutes from Parish Council meetings (ten a year), circulating planning applications and other information, liaising with local authorities and service providers, answering correspondence, e-mails and telephone calls as they arise and generally running the Parish affairs on behalf of the Councillors.

Wardington Climate Change ACTION Group?

Dear neighbours and residents of Wardington,

Perhaps like us, over the past few years, you have become more aware of the pace of climate change and more concerned with trying to find ways of helping to meet its challenges. We are all aware of extreme weather events across the world and our loss of many species of plants and animals.

Two recent documentary series have set out very powerfully the challenges we are facing:

- Sir David Attenborough's **Climate Change the Facts** (58 minutes)
- Climate Change: Ade on the Frontline (a series of 3 one hour programs discovering how life is being affected now in The Solomon Islands and Australia, Bangladesh and Bhutan, and looking at potential solutions across the world.)

Both of these programs are available now on BBC i Player.

We benefit from living in a conservation area, but how much more could be achieved by coming together as a community, sharing our knowledge and experience, to explore and identify some practical steps we might take, collectively and individually, to help make a positive difference.

Some ideas to explore might include:

- ⇒ joint bulk buying of solar panels across the community
- ⇒ investigating ground source heat pumps
- ⇒ additional tree planting to absorb carbon dioxide and provide more oxygen
- ⇒ joint habitat help for hedgehogs (pathways from garden to garden)
- ⇒ allocating communal space for wildflowers (reference https://www.wildlifefriendlyvillage.co.uk inspired by Wildlife Trust's Wilder Future Campaign)
- ⇒ placing charging points for electric vehicles within the village (reference Oxfordshire's project installing points for fast charging in public car parks arranged through a phone app that pre-books times and also handles payments.)

We would welcome our Parish Council discussing possibilities of initiatives that we might explore together, inviting interested parishioners to join and form a proactive Wardington Climate Change ACTION Group.

Keeping Oxfordshire moving

Anyone who drives in Oxfordshire knows of the problems caused by one irresponsible motorist parking in the wrong place. The majority of motorists park correctly. However, a vehicle parked incorrectly can directly impact on road safety, cause congestion, affect income for local businesses, reduce the quality of life for residents and adversely affect those with impaired mobility.

What is changing?

Under the introduction of civil parking enforcement powers (CPE), parking enforcement in Cherwell, South Oxon and Vale of White Horse will be taken over from the Police by Oxfordshire County Council. This will result in increased, more consistent enforcement of waiting and loading restrictions across the Districts.

Why do we need parking enforcement?

The effective management of waiting and loading restrictions will allow us to match enforcement to our wider transport strategies.

This will mean:

- Less blocking of traffic routes by incorrectly parked vehicles.
- Reduction in parking in disabled bays by non-badge holders.
- Better traffic management and improved compliance with parking restrictions.

It will:

- Encourage correct, sensible and safe parking in Oxfordshire.
- Reduce congestion on roads.
- Help the emergency services access emergencies.
- Make it safer for drivers and pedestrians.
- Enable buses to operate more effectively.
- Improve air quality, health and the general environment.
- Keep Oxfordshire moving.

Would You Like to be a Wardington Parish Councillor?

Wardington Parish Council is looking for an additional Councillor. There are six at the moment: three from Wardington and three from Williamscot.

If you have read the recently updated booklet 'Wardington Past and Present' you will know that the Parish in terms of area is one of the largest parishes in Oxfordshire. It includes Wardington itself, Williamscot and Coton. The population is around six hundred. In recent years there has been a very welcome increase in young children.

The Parish Council has statutory powers and responsibilities. These include the budgeting and spending of public money, responding to planning applications and liaising with Cherwell District Council and Oxfordshire County Council. The Council also has a general duty to be aware of, and respond to, the needs and concerns of all residents.

To be effective the Parish Council requires a mix of people: younger people, older people, people who have lived here a long time, people who are new. It also needs a mix of knowledge, skills and backgrounds.

There are ten regular Parish Council meetings a year. Councillors do take on projects and acts of community service outside the meetings when they are able to. They are supported by the Parish Clerk. The Clerk is responsible for the management and administration of Council affairs and advising Councillors on procedures.

How will it work?

Our strategy is to keep Oxfordshire moving by targeting known problem areas and ensuring traffic flows during peak periods. The council has appointed a contractor Conduent Parking Solutions, to provide a team of Civil Enforcement Officers that have been issued with clear guidelines setting out what is, and is not allowed.

Civil Enforcement Officers have responsibility for issuing Penalty Charge Notices (parking tickets) to people who ignore parking restrictions and park inappropriately.

Q. Do Civil Enforcement Officers receive bonuses for the number of tickets they Issue?



A. Civil Enforcement Officers do not receive bonuses or incentives for the number of tickets they issue. Under government rules any surplus raised from parking tickets is used for highway and environmental reasons.

How are penalties dealt with?

Penalty charges are £70 or £35 if paid within 14 days and £50 and £25 paid within 14 days depending on the parking contravention. Parking on double vellow lines or in a disabled bay without a blue badge is more serious than for example not clearly displaying a valid pay and display ticket, and this is reflected in the penalty charge levels.

There is a range of easy ways to pay parking tickets which are detailed on the Penalty Charge Notice. Unpaid parking tickets are a civil debt recoverable in the same way as any other such debt.

An appeal system is available to anyone who wants to challenge the ticket they have received. This includes a right of appeal to an independent adjudicator.

Please note that yellow line parking restrictions apply to the whole of the highway on the side that they are marked, including any footway or verge. Therefore, parking on a footway or verge next to yellow lines can result in a parking ticket being issued.



Loading restrictions are shown by yellow lines on the kerb, or at the edge of the carriageway. They indicate that loading or unloading is prohibited during the times shown on the signs.

Double yellow lines on the kerb mean no loading or unloading at any time. A single yellow line means no loading or unloading during the times shown.

Loading bays are white bays marked with the words 'Loading Only' and a sign with the white on blue trolley symbol. A sign will show the times when the bay can be used and whether loading and unloading is restricted to certain types of goods vehicles. Vehicles may not park here if they are not loading and unloading.


