
Wardington supporting local charities.

As my constant companion, he makes life with a disability much less lonely and frustrating. Together, anything is possible."







Banbury Young Homeless Project (BHYP) £1,870

BYHP was one of the two main charities that benefitted from your generosity at the June Fete. We spent a morning with this wonderfully inspirational charity, which offers guidance to young people and their families throughout the North Oxfordshire area, including Wardington. The team at BYHP is anxious to point out that its mission is not only to support homelessness, but to work by various means to prevent the breakdowns that lead to homelessness in the first place.

By providing a range of specialist interventions with direct support and advice, the project seeks to tackle the known root causes of youth homelessness. It has a well-established counselling service, which offers long-term talking therapies, covering issues such as bereavement, anxiety and low selfesteem. It also provides a confidential mediation service for families facing relationship breakdown.



Bake at 180°C for about 45 minutes.

Memorial Hall update

The village Memorial Hall had its AGM in mid-September, (minutes and accounts for which are now available on the wardington.net website). But for those who missed the meeting, some the key points are set out briefly below:

The Hall proudly counts itself as one of the most welcoming in the area; clean and well-maintained. Last year it was used for over 350 events. Regular users – indoor bowls, art, ballet, Pilates, toddler playtime, Film Nights, and occasional bookings such as birthday parties, christening parties, club get-togethers, craft sessions – together give a flavour of what the Hall can offer. Special rates, which have been frozen for two years now, continue to be offered to villagers, but both those regular and those occasional bookings are essential for the income which ensures that we can keep the Hall in the best condition. We are trying to ensure that the Hall is a useful and treasured hub for the village community – any ideas for functions which would encourage this still further would be very welcome. Forthcoming events in the Hall include Film Nights on 29th November and Friday January 25th 2025 plus Big Breakfast on Saturday 28th December in aid of MIND see elsewhere and on the back cover for more information on the events later this year.

"ALARMING OUTBREAK OF FIRE AT WARDINGTON MANOR"

This could have been written in 2004 when a fire in the roof (left) caused extensive damage to the Manor. Instead, it refers to a fire that started in the engine house behind the stables and garages and appeared in 1926.

Extensively reported in the style of the time it offers an insight into life at the Manor in the 1920s. It also shows that the community spirit shown in 2004 was alive and well in 1926. In 2004 villagers formed a human chain to help save a valuable collection of books and furniture from the building, commemorated in the painting by Nick Bashall now hanging

in the village hall. In 1926 they were saving horses.

In 1926, the Manor was the home of Mr John Beaumont Pease, who became the first Lord Wardington in 1936, and his wife the Hon Mrs Pease.

The fire was discovered by Mr C Peckover, the second chauffeur, "by which time the engine house was ablaze, the walls and rafters well alight and the fire had already penetrated into one of the horse boxes. In the stables were seven valuable hunters."

"Help was quickly forthcoming, and the Banbury Fire Brigade were telephoned. Mr Neal, the butler, and his staff, Mr Burchardt, the gardener, and his staff, and Mr T Rogers, the head stud groom, and the other stablemen were quickly on the spot, as also was Mr A Duckett of the Plough Inn, Mr B Puddle, Mr Sabin junior, and others from the village. By their combined efforts, chiefly through the aid of the Minimax fire extinguishers, they got the fire under control."

"There was great difficulty getting the horses out of the boxes, so dense was the smoke in the stables, but at last they were freed from their perilous position. It is a matter for congratulations that the fire was discovered so early as otherwise the whole range of buildings and garages would have been destroyed and the valuable hunters would have perished in the flames".

Meanwhile, the Manor's residents were blissfully unaware of the conflagration:

"Mr Pease was out, having gone over to the Tadmarton Heath Golf Club, and at the time was having a round with the Secretary Mr R A Polehampton".

"The Hon Mrs Pease was in the house all the time, but the household staff thoughtfully did not acquaint her with what was happening outside. Mr Pease arrived home in the early evening and was gratified to find that comparatively little damage had been done, and he was able to attend a meeting of the trustees of the village hall later in the evening".





1964-2023

Some of you may have noticed that outside the Memorial Hall in Wardington now stands a Holly Tree. This tree was planted almost a year ago to commemorate the life of Joanne Moore who sadly died without warning or illness on the 12th of September 2023 from a brain aneurysm.

Joanne moved to the village some 8 years ago, in 2015, with her husband to be Steve, they later got married in August 2018.

Joanne loved the village and their house, The Cottage on the Green, Upper Wardington, where they had planned to enjoy

many years together. Originally two of Joanne's three daughters Olivia and Elizabeth, also lived in the house, Alice the eldest daughter had already started to take her own path and had moved out of their original home in Shenington, a year before the move to Wardington.

Joanne lived a busy life; managing family life alongside her accountancy work, lately at The Banbury House Hotel in Banbury.



In the last few months of her life Joanne had just started to find more time in her busy schedule to socialise with villagers of both Wardington and Chacombe, meeting new friends and strengthening relationships with older friends, culminating in what became Joanne's final Cropredy music festival in 2023. The festival was always one of the highlights of Joanne's year and will never be the same for many without Joanne's presence.

Older siblings are welcome too, with activities also designed for them, and various ways to help out and be involved too.





We get many comments saying the pub is the busiest people have ever seen it, this is wonderful BUT please remember we need as many of you as possible to keep using The H&H. It is very easy to assume the pub is doing much better so therefore your support is not needed as much **UNTRUE!** Village pubs can only stay viable if they are being used. Something none of us should become complacent about, there are reminders everywhere as to why we should not. We need the local community please, thank you.

We are, and will continue, working hard on bringing new faces in, old faces back and picking up passing trade. Winter is here, the time of year when people start going out less. A scary thought for any landlord/ landlady. The time of year when our costs rise even higher, we need the heating on, the fire lit and all the lights on earlier. It is also the time of year when we will promote our beautiful fire, hearty meals and meeting up with friends and family in a wonderful atmosphere. We will be doing everything we can to keep people coming in, our Quiz Nights will start, we will do special food evenings, we have live music, bingo is possible depending on interest. We also have the Live Music Sessions, varied music, every 3rd Thursday of the month. We have totally enjoyed these evenings. They are jolly and have a wonderful group of talented people playing and singing. Everyone is welcome to either join in or simply listen, start time 7.30pm and we serve our full menu too. The games room is completed with the ceilings in and 2 heaters in place. If you fancy a game of pool, bowling or a go on the new space invaders machine (including Pac Man) it is there waiting for you. Why not head down and support the Darts Teams on a Wednesday evening.

The closure of the Edgcote Lane is having an impact on us with people from Culworth, Sulgrave and Woodford Halse way. Unfortunately, it is rather a long way round now. It seems we cannot escape HS2 or indeed the floods currently (29) Let us hope the works will be completed sooner than expected and the winter is not as wet as expected.

We are having to adjust to a smaller kitchen, we have learnt that on special food evenings we are unable to serve our full evening menu alongside, for example, Pie Nights. This has led to longer waiting times for food than we would like, and we deem unacceptable. A paper copy of our Christmas Menu is now available from behind the bar. Minutes of a meeting of the Parish Council held on Tuesday 1st October 2024 at 7:30pm in the Lady Wardington Room at Wardington Village Hall

Present: Mr R Jarrett (Chairman), Mr M Patterson, Mrs J Burnett, Mr G Page.

In attendance: Clerk, District Cllr Brant, 0 members of the public

- **51. Apologies for absence** Apologies received from Cllr N Bankes, and Cllr A Gordon-Finlayson. Apologies accepted None.
- **52.** Members' declarations of interest for items on the agenda None.
- **53.** Public participation session None.
- **54.** To approve the minutes of the Parish Council (PC) meeting held on 23rd July 2024 The minutes were proposed, agreed, and duly signed.

55. Outstanding matters/actions from previous meetings

- 55.1 HS2 update Notices have come out about single lane traffic managed by traffic lights on the section of the A361 near the EKFB compound entrance from 5th October to 27th October 2024.
- 55.2 Feedback from Defibrillator/CPR training session Around 10 parishioners attended the training session. It seemed to be generally well received and lots of useful discussions and actions came out of the session, particularly in relation to the access to and use of the defibrillator although some feedback was that the session felt unplanned/disorganised at times and that the valuable information was only due to questions from the participants. It was proposed and agreed that the Clerk should provide the feedback to St John Ambulance and make a donation of £50.
- To agree the type of Vehicle Activated Signs (VAS) the PC would like in the village After some discussion about the pros and cons of the types of signs available it was agreed that the most suitable sign would be the sign displaying the 20mph roundel and 'slow down'. Clerk to inform the supplier of the PC's preference.

56. Play Area

- Play equipment safety inspection Not available due to Cllr A Gordon-Finlayson's absence. It was suggested that a parishioner may be interested in completing the safety inspections on behalf of the PC. Cllr M Patterson to discuss this with the parishioner.
- To receive the quotes for work required on fences and gates in the play area A quote of £594.57 has been received plus up to £80 to get another spur replaced before the next inspection proposed and agreed. **Clir M Patterson to inform the contractor.**

57. Planning applications received

24/01935/TCA – **Keechbrook, Thorpe Road, Wardington.** T1 x Prunus - Reduce height by 1.5m and shape. T2 x Prunus - Reduce height by 1.5m and shape. No objection. (Response made using delegated powers).

24/02365/TCA – The Last Straw, Banbury Road Through Wardington, Wardington. T1 - Holly tree - Reduce by 50% from 14m to 7m and width from 7m to approx 5m. No objection. (Response made using delegated powers).

24/02214/TCA - Red Lion Cottage, Thorpe Road, Wardington. T1 x Purple prunus - Fell.

This Prunus tree is infected with root fungus. Around 60% of the canopy has died. Reducing it back to the remaining growth will take away the natural form so we would like to fell the tree. There are lower lying plants and shrubs which should flourish in its absence. G2 x Row of Maples and Ash - Reduce height by approximately 4m from tips. These trees have become very leggy and my clients park their cars under-



neath. We would like to reduce them to reduce risk of damage to vehicles. Fell end maple (furthest north) as this causes excessive shading on greenhouses below. No objection. (Response made using delegated powers).

24/02522/TCA – **The Limes, Thorpe Road, Wardington.** Cherry (T1) - Cutting back the cherry tree on the highway verge back to the boundary line, reducing to the nearest growth points available. approximately 3 metre reduction on the east side of the crown. **No objection**.

58. Planning decisions received

24/00471/F and **24/00476/LB** – Butlers House, Williamscot Road, Williamscot. Install new dormers to rear roof slope, alter existing rear dormers, replace bay window to rear. Form 1 new window opening. Replace 1 window in existing opening. Replace concrete pointing with lime mortar pointing on dwelling and garden wall. Replace plastic gutters and downpipes with metal alternatives. Internal alterations and installation of new mechanical ventilation unit. Approved.

23/03053/F and 23/03054/LB - The Bishops House, Street From Banbury Road To Mount Pleasant, Wardington. Insertion of conservation rooflights in rear roof slope to facilitate use of roof space as habitable accommodation, and conversion of stable to ancillary guest accommodation. Approved.

24/01492/F - Pubstuff, Williamscot Road Industrial Centre, Williamscot Road, Cropredy. Warehouse/industrial storage and light assembly/workshop. Approved.

24/01596/LB – Home Farm, Street from Williamscot Hill to Centre, Williamscot. Replacement of 5no windows on south and west elevations with new double glazed metal framed windows with timber subframes to match rest of dwelling. Approved.

- 59. Concerns raised about an unlicensed scrap collector in the parish whose collected scrap is attracting rats The Clerk has not been able to chase Cherwell District Council (CDC) on this due to requiring further information. The Clerk will send an e-mail to CDC to see what information they can provide.
- **60. Memorial Hall Walnut Tree** The Memorial Hall are going to have to get a tree removed and they wondered if the PC would like them to get a quote for some treework to a tree overhanging the play area as it may be cheaper to get the work done at the same time. The PC appreciate the Memorial Hall making them aware that there is a potential safety issue with the tree overhanging the play area but the PC will deal with it in house so no quote is required.
